

As the 33rd Attorney General of California, and the first Latino to hold the office in state history, I have been a staunch advocate for hardworking families, bringing decades of experience to defend the rights of nearly 40 million Californians. Since becoming Attorney General, I have earned more endorsements than any other candidate in the race and, in a poll of California Primary voters, lead my Democratic challenger by 3-1.

My work as our state's chief law enforcement officer follows more than two decades of service to the people of Los Angeles in the U.S. Congress, where I was also elected to serve in leadership — chairing the Congressional Hispanic Caucus and then becoming the Chairman of the Democrats in the House of Representatives. In the House, I served on the powerful Ways and Means Committee, becoming the first Latino ever to do so.

I have fought relentlessly for smart, affordable healthcare in California, and throughout America.

I'm leading the fight in court to keep healthcare affordable and accessible, defending the Affordable Care Act (ACA). We are also tackling opioid abuse, pursuing pharmaceutical manufacturers and opioid distributors who've engaged in unlawful practices in the marketing, sale, and distribution of opioids. And we have taken Sutter Health, the largest healthcare system in Northern California to court to challenge their anti-competitive consolidation activities which cost patients and consumers thousands of dollars in higher healthcare costs.

As a public official, patient and the husband of a physician, I have a deep understanding and great respect for everyone who works hard to care for the wellbeing of our California families. That includes chiropractors who do the important job of helping keep our workers and families, including me, healthy across our state.

During my time in Congress, I played a leading role in some of the biggest national battles for health care reform. I helped draft the Affordable Care Act, crafting language to expand access to care and lower costs for modest income seniors in Medicare. As a senior Member of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, I looked after seniors' health, leading House Democrats in the fight to stop a 20 percent cut to Social Security Disability Insurance benefits in 2015.

My work to promote affordable care began as an attorney in the 1980's, representing modest income Americans with mental illness. But my commitment to protecting the rights of ALL Californians to access to quality healthcare traces its roots to my upbringing. I am the son of immigrants, the first in my family to attend a University. I saw what insecurity looks like, and I learned what it takes to overcome and succeed, so now it's time for me to reach out to you to work together to ensure our mutual vision of health California succeeds.
